Meet Fiddler Who Is Infected By Heartworm

Fiddler is a sad example of what happens when pet owners do not have their pets tested and treated with monthly heartworm preventative. He came to Wyandotte Animal Control and tested positive for heartworm when he made the trip to Humane Ohio on the monthly shuttle to be neutered. Heartworm treatment is both expensive and dangerous, but there was no question in the volunteers' minds that Fiddler needed to be saved. Volunteers raised the necessary funds to treat Fiddler, and he pulled through like a champ. He has since been adopted but continues to serve as a reminder to everyone how important and easy it is to protect your pets from this deadly disease.

Heartworm Disease And Your Dog

Heartworm disease is a serious and sometimes fatal disease for dogs. It is caused by a parasite called *Dirofilaria immitis* that is transmitted by mosquitoes. Mosquitoes become infected by biting dogs that are already infected with heartworms. Any dog living or visiting an area that has mosquitoes and infected dogs is at risk of getting heartworm disease.

The Heartworm Life Cycle in Dogs

- A mosquito ingests tiny, immature worms, called microfilariae, in a blood meal from a heartworm-infected host animal.
- The microfilariae develop inside the mosquito, becoming infective larvae within two to three weeks.
- The mosquito transmits the infective larvae when it bites a new host.
- The larvae develop inside the dog's body tissues, then enter the bloodstream and move toward the heart and blood vessels. The larvae grow into adult worms inside the heart, where they will live until they die (about five to seven years). Adult heartworms can grow to over a foot in length.
- After five to six months inside the heart, female worms release microfilariae into the blood, and the cycle starts again.

Signs Of The Disease

Dogs infected with heartworms may not show any signs of disease for one or two years. By then, the disease may have already damaged the dog's heart, lungs, liver, and kidneys. The most common

signs of heartworm infection are a dry, chronic cough; general weakness; shortness of breath; and lack of stamina. These signs occur because the heartworms clog the heart and blood vessels, making the heart less efficient and reducing the blood supply.

All of the signs associated with heartworm disease will be more noticeable after extensive exercise. In advanced cases, the dog may have congestive heart failure, swelling in the abdomen or legs, weight loss, and/or anemia.

Diagnosing The Disease

The most common way to detect heartworm disease is from a blood test, which detects antigens produced by the adult female heartworms. Your veterinarian may also look at the blood sample under a microscope to see if any microfilariae are present. If the results of these tests are positive for heartworm, additional blood work, X-rays, and echocardiograms may be in order to further determine how extensive the infection is, the number of worms present in your dog's body, and the amount of damage they have done to the dog's vital organs. These tests can also help determine whether or not your dog will be able to tolerate the heartworm treatment.

Treating Heartworm

The vast majority of heartworm patients are treated successfully. Treatment consists of both eliminating the parasites and managing the heart, vascular, and systemic problems caused by the infection. If the infection is not too severe, your veterinarian will likely give your dog a special medication to kill the adult heartworms. Your dog will then need a month's rest to rid herself of the decomposing worms. Following this, you will need to give your dog some medicine to kill the microfilariae. Your pet should then be put on a prevention program to avoid becoming re-infected.

Preventing Heartworm

The easiest way to manage heartworm disease is to prevent it. This can be done with oral and topical medications. Discuss the available preventatives with your veterinarian to find out which medication is best for your dog. Many veterinarians now recommend year-round heartworm prevention.

Heartworm Disease And Your Cat

Heartworm disease is less common in cats than in dogs, because cats are not the "natural" host for the heartworm parasite. However, any cat living in or visiting an area that has mosquitoes and infected cats is at risk of getting heartworm disease. When they do become infected, cats with heartworm disease typically show less severe signs than dogs with the disease. However, heartworm disease in cats can be quite dangerous, even deadly. So it is important to have your cat tested, and the use of heartworm preventative is important as well.

Did You Know?***Dogs And Cats Grieve Just As Humans Do***

An animal that is experiencing the loss of another animal companion may show signs of grief similar to those shown by a person grieving the loss of a human loved one.

Also, death and dying are two of the hardest facts of life to explain to children. Very often, the death of a family pet is a child's first encounter with this immutable law of nature.

Because our pets cannot speak, we don't really know what they are thinking. We must base our interpretations of their emotional state on their behavior – what they do in certain situations and under specific circumstances. When a person experiences the death of a human loved one, we may know they feel grief based on what they say. Very often, however, it is how they react and what they do that tells us they are suffering. They lose their focus, become listless and disoriented, don't eat and become disinterested in what is happening around them. They may cry or go without sleep or they may sleep more.

An animal that is experiencing the loss of another animal companion may react similarly. "Some animals can actually become depressed when they lose a loved one," says Monique D. Chretien, MSc, AHT, Animal Behavior Consultant. "They show symptoms similar to humans such as loss of interest in their favorite activities and sleeping more than usual. However, sometimes dogs and cats hide and sleep more than usual when they are ill, so you should consult with your veterinarian before seeing a behaviorist if your pet exhibits symptoms such as these."

Your pet may lose his appetite, become disoriented, or become more clingy. If the deceased pet was taken to a veterinarian to be euthanized, the grieving pet may sit at the window for days watching for its return. Animal behaviorists commonly call this emotional state, separation anxiety. The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals conducted a Companion Animal Mourning Project in 1996. The study found that 46% of cats ate less than usual after the death of another cat companion. In some extreme cases, the cat actually starved to death. About 70% of cats meowed more than normal or meowed less. Study respondents indicated that surviving cats changed the quantity and location of sleep. More than half the surviving pets became more affectionate and clingy with their caregivers. Overall, the study revealed that 65% of cats exhibited four or more behavioral changes after losing a pet companion.

If your pet shows signs that she is grieving the loss of an animal or human family member, provide her with more attention and affection. Try to take her mind off it by engaging her in a favorite activity. If she enjoys human company, invite friends that she

likes to visit and spend time with her. You can also use environmental enrichment techniques such as balls filled with treats to help keep her busy. Hide toys at her favorite spots for her to find during the day. If your pet is too depressed over the loss, she may not respond to extra activity right away. The old saying, "time heals all wounds," has meaning for your pet, too.

If your dog is barking more or whining, distract her. Don't give her treats to distract her or you might unintentionally reinforce the barking. Giving attention during any behavior will help to reinforce it so be sure you are not reinforcing a behavior that you don't like. Give attention at a time when your dog is engaging in behaviors that you do like, such as when she is resting quietly or watching the birds. As the pain of the loss begins to subside, so should the vocalizing as long as it is related to the grieving process. You may also want to consult with your veterinarian regarding drug therapy to help decrease your dog's anxiety.

If you are thinking about adding another pet, wait until you and your surviving pet have adjusted to the loss. Forcing your pet to get to know a newcomer will only add stress to her already anxiety-ridden emotional state. Also, be patient – remember your pet misses her companion as much as you do.

Spay Day is an annual campaign of The Humane Society of the United States and Humane Society International to inspire people to save animal lives by spaying or neutering pets and feral cats. For the last three years, PAWS has participated in Spay Day, which encompasses the entire month of February. This year, we held two Spay Day fundraisers. One of the fundraisers was at Wendy’s restaurant in Woodhaven which benefited our Spay/Neuter Assistance Program (SNAP). We also sponsored a low-cost microchip clinic to raise funds for our upcoming spay/neuter clinic. In addition to these two events, we also transported 51 owned animals and feral cats to spay/neuter clinics in Warren and Toledo and either fully funded or subsidized the cost of their surgeries through our SNAP.

PAWS also participated in the HSUS Spay Day photo contest that was held in conjunction with other Spay Day activities. The contest is designed to raise funds for organizations participating in Spay Day.

We've been trapping, neutering and returning them here with the tremendous help of a big-hearted and truly great lady from PAWS. So finally it came time to see if we could trap Torro. We are so very blessed to have BOTH of them. It's so worth giving a chance to a poor stray. All lives have changed for the better. We are truly blessed to have him in our lives and in our hearts. We can't imagine life without him. And, by the way, my husband is allergic to cats, but we get Acepromazine drops from the vet's office, and we put one drop a day into their food and it totally neutralized their dander.

We don't know how long Tippy had been out on the streets on his own. The vet thinks he's about seven to eight years old. He had a very long journey to finally find us and we're so very grateful that he did – including Tippy!!

Something everyone should know . . . this is a lesson in why you should always get your animals spayed and neutered. It can change their personality completely – causing them to be sweet and loving animals! Additionally, for individuals who may be allergic to cats, but could find a place in their heart and home for a cat, you might try Acepromazine drops to prevent an allergic reaction!
